Activity Ideas: Easi-Speak

To support speaking and listening skills (oracy skills) here are some suggestions of ways to use the Easi-Speaks.



Record your ideas

Children can use the Easi-Speak to record their ideas, stories or thoughts before they write them down. They can then listen back for support while they concentrate on the more physical writing skill without forgetting their creative ideas.

Explanations

Ask pupils to record their learning and explanations on to the microphone, for example maths explanations. The challenge of explanation with no visuals helps to embed their understanding of the mathematical methods they are using.

Roving Reporters

Elect "Roving Reporters" on school excursions or for sports matches. They can record their reports onto the microphones and then add these to podcasts or use them to write up the action later for a school newsletter or for the school website.

Editing

As extension tasks, ask pupils to record their writing and listen back as part of the editing process. Was it interesting to listen to? Did it make sense? The listening back often picks up many things that reading back through does not!
