Talking Frogs User Guide (EL46408)



These tactile, recordable frogs are great for use both indoors and outside. They can be used in messy play, to add character to your reading area or be used in sand and water play - yes, that's right! Technology that is waterproof! These little amphibians are perfect for creating engaging learning activities with a focus on speaking and listening.

Each pack contains 10 frogs.

This easy-to-use guide provides everything you need to get started with the TTS Talking Frogs. This guide covers:

- How to record a message on a frog
- How to play back a message
- How to replace the batteries when they run out and the type needed
- A short video clip showing the frogs in action with a quick user demonstration

How to record a message on the frog

- 1. To start a recording, press the small green button under the frog's chin then let go of the button. You will hear a beep and see a red light appear on the frog's back. This means it is recording.
- 2. You have up to **10 seconds** to record your message.
- 3. When you have finished recording, you can either:
 - Press the green button again to end the recording (you'll hear two beeps to confirm that the message has been recorded), or
 - Let the 10 seconds run out the frog will beep twice automatically to confirm the message has been saved.

How to play back a message

- 1. Once you have recorded a message, you can listen to it by pressing the top of the frog's back.
- 2. You will be able to see that the message is being played back as a green light will appear on the top of the frog's back.





How to replace the batteries when they run out and the type needed

- Each frog requires 3 x LR44 batteries.
- To replace the batteries, remove the battery hatch cover (underside of the frog frog) with a screwdriver and responsibly dispose of any exhausted batteries.
- Insert new batteries.
- Once the batteries have been replaced and the hatch screwed back into place, the frogs will then be ready to start recording, talking and submerged back into water.
